A boutique hotel with 55-60 hotel rooms is the path forward for the Hadley School. The project is centered around keeping much of the current school facade and structure intact. Plans call for a restaurant that could employ up to 125 full-time employees, rooftop bar, event space and dog-friendly amenities. The firm will redevelop and manage the space over the next three years.



Climate Change Brings More Flooding Impacts and Action for Swampscott

The effects of climate change are already being felt here in town. Storm surges are becoming more severe. According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, global sea levels have risen 8-9 inches since 1880 and are projected to rise another 1-8 feet by 2100.

This means more flooding for coastal communities like Swampscott. The flood map below from the MA Office of Coastal Zone Management shows significant portions of Swampscott will be inundated during a major storm in 2050 due to sea level rise. Areas especially at risk include Phillips Park, Humphrey Street and shoreline properties.



There are steps we can take to protect Swampscott. For example, to absorb flood impacts, living shorelines use plants, sand, and limited rock structures to stabilize the shoreline while providing habitat and water quality benefits. Unlike hard structures like sea walls, living shorelines are flexible and can adapt to rising sea levels.

Get involved and make your voice heard at the local level and participate in actions to build resilience! Working together, we can protect our community from increased flooding due to climate change.







E. F. GILMORE DAV CELEBRATED A VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR

The E. F. Gilmore DAV recently celebrated a record year of accomplishments according to Commander Jeffrey Blonder. "We are the largest and most active Veterans Service Organization in the North Shore. This past year we served the veterans of Swampscott and will continue to serve the veterans and their families in the coming year" Highlights of this past year include:

Helped over 20 residents of Swampscott and Lynn file claims with the VA. Many of these claims

resulted in either new or additional compensations for

veterans and their families.

- Held our first annual Mental Health Summit. This event brought together experts to begin the conversation of mental health and suicide prevention for both veterans and teens.
- Continued to support Habitat+ organization. This is a transitional home for veterans suffering homelessness and substance abuse issues.
- Held a Veterans Beach Party. Using a grant awarded by Better Beach organization and we were able to bring disabled veterans to Lynn Beach to enjoy a fun day at the beach.
- Held a forum for candidates for both the Swampscott Select Board and Lynn City Council.
- Collected and made a donation to assist veterans who were affected by the Maui fires and Hurricane Adelia.
- Collected toys for families of Massachusetts National Guard members.
- Participated in the Massachusetts LGBTQ+ Resource Fair.
- Two of our members were appointed by Governor Healey to positions on her Veterans Advisory Boards. Jeffrey Blonder was appointed to be a member of the Advisory Committee on Veterans Services and Andrea Gayle-Bennett was appointed to the Advisory Commission for Women Veterans, where she serves as Chair

All of this has been accomplished without funding from any local or state government agencies.
